

- Vaccinations are free to anyone who lives and works in San Francisco, You do not need insurance to book an appointment.
- If you have a friend without computer access, help them sign up or get an appointment!

Who Is Eligible When?

- Currently eligible for vaccines?
- Frontline healthcare workers (including IHSS workers)
- Long term care residents
- People 65 years and older
- Caregivers, including those under 65, with an "attestation"
- Coming soon
- Feb. 24 people who work in childcare, emergency services food and agricultural sectors.
- March 15 two groups of younger, high-risk Californians people
 with disabilities and people with severe underlying conditions will
 be able to get vaccinated against the coronavirus

 City College of San Francisco (drive-through) – paused for now, 2nd shot appointment still planned

The City has partnered with UCSF to vaccinate eligible people at City College of San Francisco.

People 65 and over are eligible to book an appointment. You do not need insurance to book an appointment.

Appointments at City College are by invitation only because of the limited supply of vaccines. Sometimes extra appointments become available. Check here for availability .

• SF Produce Market – 901 Rankin Street in the Hunters Point Neighborhood for 65 plus and Health care workers. This site is partnered with Sutter Health as well as the Fire Department and Dept. of Public Health. When fully operational, appointments 8:00 to 5:00 but appointment needed. To schedule appointment, go to SF.gov/getvaccinated and through Sutter's My Health Online portal. For those without computer access, they can schedule an appointment through Sutter's Center at (844) 987-6115.

 Drop-in vaccinations are available to people 65 and older who have proof of residency in one

 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. 7 days per week
- Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital
 - 1001 Potrero Avenue, Building 30 on the 2nd Floor (off 23rd Street) **new zip codes added**Drop-in vaccinations are only available for people who meet the following qualifications: live in zip codes
 94107, 94110, 94112, or 94124 or 94132; are 65 and older. Now no insurance restrictions and the
 vaccination is free. Those eligible can drop in from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. any day 7 days a week, without an
 appointment. Patients must show proof of age and residency, such as a utility bill or driver's license.
 Those with Medi-Cal or Healthy San Francisco should bring their insurance card.
- SF Community Clinics in Western Addition, Chinatown, Bayview, Outer Sunset and Potrero Hill are continuing to offer their patients vaccinations.
- Sites in the Excelsior and Visitacion Valley: coming soon.

One more site added today!

- Dignity GoHealth has opened a Vaccine Clinic at 1600 Market Street for San Francisco residents who are 65 years and older and San Francisco healthcare workers/community health workers.
 - To schedule an appointment, all they need is the person's name and cell phone.

Currently shows availability for appointments on 2/18/2021 and 2/19/2021 only, but additional slots will open up hopefully. The eligible person needs to bring photo ID and insurance card (if they have insurance). Eligible persons will be asked to verify the information entered in the online registration process (or complete the registration process if there were difficulties prior to arrival), sign conditions of registration and vaccine consent – available in multiple languages: English, Spanish, Mandarin, Russian and Tagalog. Registration can happen onsite. There will be a full range of translation services available onsite via a translator phone line.

Partnerships with Pharmacies

Partnerships with Pharmacies

The Department of Public Health will partner with Safeway Pharmacy, CVS, and Walgreen's to eventually expand vaccination services throughout the City. The first major site has opened at San Francisco State.

Currrent Groups Beyond Seniors

Health Care Staff

Health care staff (including staff at long-term care facilities, EMT workers, in-home support providers and others) can find out about how to access vaccines as part of the priority 1a group.

Caregivers

California has just approved a process by which personal, family and other homecare providers can receive the vaccine, even if they are under 65. This health care worker verification site has been updated to reflect eligibility for all care providers. Please review the Home Health, Home Care and In-Home Supportive Services section and this "attestation" form. Language translation will be available this week.

Coming soon...

People Under 65 With Disabilities

NEW – Starting March 15, two groups of younger, high-risk Californians — people with disabilities and people with severe underlying conditions — will be able to get vaccinated against the coronavirus. This includes cancer, chronic kidney disease at stage four or above, chronic pulmonary disease, Down syndrome, a weakened immune system from a solid organ transplant, sickle cell disease, pregnancy, heart conditions, severe obesity and Type 2 diabetes.

Anyone Unable to Travel to a Vaccination Site

No local provider has addressed this issue but advocacy continues. Join Senior and Disability Action to help push. Find more information here and learn when resources become available. In the meantime, keep in touch with the Mayor's Office on Disability for other assistance.

Transportation Resources

Getting back and forth to a vaccination site can be a challenge. This is a good time to check out the Paratransit
Essential Trip Card for subsidized taxi services.
